Asia is the world's largest and most populous continent. With almost four billion people, it is home to more than 60% of the world's current population, including the two largest national populations; China and India. Asia is also the center of some of the fastest sustained economic growth rates in the world as well as some of the most intractable problems of poverty. It is home to several language families and many language isolates. Indeed, Asia is both diverse and dynamic in terms of population growth trends. There are many emerging population issues having significant impacts on the future of the world's population as they pose major challenges to communities and local governments across the region. Thus, there is a great need for scientific studies of population that can be translated into policy actions in countries with diverse socio-demographic settings.

APA was registered in Bangkok in 2008 and the Secretariat was set up at the College of Population Studies in the University of Chulalongkorn. In 2011, the Secretariat was moved to the Institute for Population and Social Research at Mahidol University. A change in the constitution in 2012 extended the term of the council from two to three years. The third online election of the APA was held in 2012 and the following members were elected as council members.

Plenary I	Optimizing Potentials, Meeting Needs: New Agenda for Youth in Development

Presenter 1

Approaches to Adolescent Sexual and Reproductive Health *Baochang Gu*

Center for Population and Development Studies, Renmin University of China

Along with fertility decline the issues of adolescent sexual and reproductive health (ARH) becomes salient. Due to earlier puberty and later marriage, adolescents tend to have longer exposure to unsafe sex. Unintended pregnancy, unsafe abortion and unmarried childbearing are all increasing. More and more programmes have been launched in recent years in addressing the ARH issues. Various approaches have been employed in the programmes. Some regard it as a rights issue to protect the rights of adolescents on sexual and reproductive health, while others emphasize it as a medical issue to disseminate the sexual knowledge among the adolescents.

This presentation will discuss the approach used in the ARH programme run by China Family Planning Association (CFPA) since the late 1990s. In the CFPA programme ARH is seen as a social issue, and the programme aims to help the adolescents for a healthy development in life. The CFPA/ARH programme emphasizes life skill training rather than simple dissemination of sexual knowledge, emphasizes peer education rather than imposing on the youth, emphasizes participatory work rather than lectures. It has further established a China Youth Network (CYN) to ensure the programme is truly guided by the needs of adolescents, who become not only participatory but proactive in the programme activities, involving in the whole process from design, planning and implementation to evaluation. Recent development of ARH Clubs in various formats makes the ARH Programme even more sustainable.

Presenter 2

The Impact of Training Programmes by NGO on the Knowledge, Attitude and Health Practices of Young Girls in Gujarat, India Leela Visaria

Gujarat Institute of Development Research

India is undergoing demographic transition in which the adolescents and youths constitute more than half of the population. Although adolescence is a healthy stage of life, their sexual and reproductive health needs have taken center stage in public health policy debate. Because of greater vulnerabilities experienced by girls, their needs have become the focus of planners, academia and civil society organizations. Efforts are being made to increase awareness among adolescent

girls about their health and reproductive needs, legal rights, retaining them in schools and creating livelihood options through various government sponsored programmes as well as by non-governmental organisations.

By reviewing one training programme undertaken by an NGO in the state of Gujarat, India, we tried to understand its impact on the knowledge, attitude, and health practices of young girls. Using quasi-experimental design, data were collected by both quantitative and qualitative methods.

While analyzing the data from the perspective of overall development of adolescent girls, a number of positive as well as lacunae in the content of training material and methodology became evident. One of the challenges surfaced was that the trainers demonstrated limited understanding of the process of adolescent development from physical, cognitive, psycho-logical and social perspectives. Adolescent girls were keen to learn more about issues such as risk taking, drug and alcohol abuse, boy-girl relationships, and sexuality, but a lot of focus in the training was on menstrual hygiene. Many girls had witnessed physical violence in their homes and needed support and assurance that relationships can flourish without any violence as well as guidance on how to handle violent behavior of partners if they faced it in their lives. These issues were rarely addressed during the training.

The presentation will thus, while discussing specific findings from the review of a training programme conducted by an NGO in Gujarat, focus on the broader issues such as the need for gender-sensitive training of the trainers, a deeper understanding of the needs of adolescents to help them grow into adults prepared to face the challenges of real world.

Presenter 3

The Aspirations of Young People for Science and Career Growth: Mismatch between Career Aspiration and Future Needs in Labor Market Wong Chan Yuan
University of Malaya

In the race for acquiring technological entrepreneurial rents in the global production value chain, many emerging economies in Asia are striving to develop a pool of talents to achieve high technology industrial development. Malaysia aspires to have a critical mass of young people equipped with the entrepreneurial skills and science based technological knowledge to propel economic growth. However, young people may be interested in jobs that are perceived to be glamorous or well paid. Such aspirations may compromise the need for collective mobilization of resources for skill development in the labor market needed for future growth. This presentation will share our observations on the issues of this mismatch and a context of which it elucidates the precondition of an economy that is favorable to support a desired development.

Presenter 4

Optimizing Potentials, Meeting Needs: New Agenda for Youth in Development Nurul Ainun Ahmad Atory

University of Malaya

There are approximately 1.8 billion youths in the world, and they make up nearly 40 per cent of unemployed persons globally. Around 85 per cent of young people live in developing countries, and many young people migrate from rural areas to the cities to seek opportunities. As the world is undergoing economic downturn, jobs are difficult to find, and the price of food and fuel are escalating. With the high cost living in the cities, many people including the youths are forced to work informally and live in slums. If the large numbers of unemployed youths do not receive the necessary assistance, they will be trapped in poverty, and at risk of being exploited, with little access to higher education and health care all of which can fuel political unrest. There is a need to optimize the potentials of young people who are IT savvy, creative, innovative, energetic and with high level of social networking, awareness of social issues. Policy makers should design structured and holistic approaches to equip the youth as future leaders in the new development agenda for youths in development.

Presenter 1

Population Dynamics and Social Policy: National Transfer Accounts (NTA) Approach

Sang-Hyop Lee

East West Center and University of Hawaii, Manoa

Several countries in Asia, such as India and the Philippines, are experiencing a demographic dividend as their populations become increasingly concentrated in the working ages. For these countries, it is important to examine conditions and policies that affect the size of the dividend and convert the transitory age distribution benefit into a long term boost for rates of economic growth. In other countries in Asia, such as Japan, China, and Vietnam, the working-age population is growing slowly or in decline and the old-age population is growing rapidly. There are concerns about slow economic growth or economic decline due to a large dependent old-age population or low saving rates. The National Transfer Accounts (NTA) provides a unique and invaluable framework for investigating how changes in population age structure will influence economic development, economic security, generational equity, gender equality, public finances, retirement and pension, human resources such as education and healthcare, and many other important public policy issues. The goal of the NTA is to improve our understanding of the generational economy, and describes the

age patterns of economic activity and the economic relations between the generations. The presentation provides an overview of the NTA and demonstrate how the accounting system by age addresses the issues related with population dynamics and social policy issues.

Presenter 2

Macroeconomic Policy Analyses by Using National Transfer Accounts: New Evidence and Implications for India

M.R. Narayana

Institute for Social and Economic Change, Bangalore

Construction of Flow-Account Identity of National Transfer Accounts (NTA) has a great potential for many macroeconomic policy analyses. This presentation offers new evidence for India based on the analyses of (a) growth effects of age structure transition through First Demographic Dividend and (b) proposals for public-funded and universal old age pension policies and their fiscal sustainability as India experiences population ageing. Policy implications from these analyses are highlighted by needs for (i) productivity improvement through human capital investments, (ii) public-expenditure switching and generosity policies to meet with additional public resources requirements for implementation of universal old age pension schemes, and (iii) overall fiscal policy adjustments to achieve a long term inter-generational equity. Subject to the comparability of economic structures, the above NTA-based macroeconomic analyses, evidence and implications of India are of relevance for growth and distribution oriented policy-design in other developing countries of Asia.

Presenter 3

National Transfer Accounts and Fiscal Impacts of Demographic Transition in Thailand

Suphannada Lowhachai

National Economic and Social Development Board, Government of Thailand

Over the past decade, Thailand has experienced rapid demographic change toward an aging society. This brings about both economic and social impacts to the country. The latest National Transfer Account (NTA) of Thailand is employed to analyze the current pattern of income and consumption across ages in Thailand. A brief history of NTA in Thailand will be introduced followed by a summary of the compilation methods. Then the results of NTA will be presented to illustrate how each age group acquires sources to finance their consumption demand as well as the overall interactions of population across generations. Finally, the effect of demographic change on the overall life-cycle balance will be analyzed with policy implications to handle such impacts.

Plenary III Presidential Address Manhattan II

Who Will Lead Asia's Data Revolution? <u>Terence Hull</u>

Australian National University, Canberra, ACT, Australia

In September 2014 the United Nations convened the Independent Expert Advisory Group on the Data Revolution to implement one of the key recommendations of the High Level Panel on the Post-2015 Development Agenda. This Group released its report in November 2014, with the title: A World that Counts: Mobilising the Data Revolution for Sustainable Development. They issued a strong call to action, with the warning that "Without immediate action, gaps between developed and developing countries, between information-rich and information-poor people, and between the private and public sectors will widen, and risks of harm and abuses of human rights will grow." The use of the term Data Revolution is provocative, but also broad. It refers to both the nature and volume of data generated in the digital world, and the methodologies used in the manipulation, analysis, and understanding of data by people across the globe. For Asia the notion of a data revolution rubs up against the great differences between nations and peoples, economies and cultures. This paper considers the ways in which population specialists in Asia might work with governments and civil society to revolutionise the way data are used for sustainable development.

Plenary IV	Population Mobility in Asia: Issues and Challenges

Presenter 1

Transnational Care Migration in Asia <u>Brenda S.A. Yeoh</u> National University of Singapore

With the quickening pace of Asia(ns) on the move, social worlds in an increasingly interconnected Asia are experiencing considerable flux. Concepts that have emerged in the literature in recent decades such as the 'transnational family', 'global householding' and 'global care chain' draw attention to the observation that the formation and sustenance of households is increasingly reliant on the international movement of people and transactions among household members residing in more than one national territory. In the wake of rapid fertility decline and shortage of women's reproductive labour in the more developed economies in Asia, strategies of care substitution have drawn on the labour of transnational subjects (mainly women) in both institutionalized settings and the privatized sphere of the home. Reflecting on the gender and class

implications of transnational care migration allows us to better understand the links between transnational migration and social change in Asia.

Presenter 2

Refugee and Forced Migration in Asia

Mohammad Jalal Abbasi-Shavazi

University of Tehran; National Institute of Population Research; and the Australian National University

Refugee and other forced migrations have increased substantially in scale, complexity and diversity in recent decades. These changes have meant that traditional approaches to management and solution of refugee and other forced migration situations and protection of refugees have become less appropriate.

By the end of 2013, there were around 51.2 million forcibly displaced people worldwide, 16.7 million of whom were refugees and 33.3 million were internally displaced persons. A significant proportion of refugees were residing in Asia, and several major refugee-sending and receiving countries were Asian. Despite the increasing volume and complexity of forced migration in the region, most demographic studies on migration have been focused on voluntary/unforced movements, and data collection and training and research on forced migration is still a neglected area.

This presentation focuses on the level of refugee and forced migrations with special focus on the Asian region, and discusses the driving forces of refugee migration and its policy implications for advancing the Demography of Refugees.

Presenter 3

A Region in Flux: International Migrations in Asia, Asia in International Migrations

Maruja M.B. Asis

Scalabrini Migration Center

Asia started to register perceptible levels of international migration from the 1970s, initiated by the demand for workers in the Gulf Cooperating Council countries. Although it was (and is) designed to be temporary, labor migration not only persisted but expanded and diversified over the decades, and in addition, other types of international migration emerged. The presentation will provide an overview of key trends and patterns of international migrations in Asia and highlight selected issues and challenges (and opportunities) engendered by the phenomena. Intimations of "Asia"-specific characteristics and issues call for further study and may have implications for theorizing about international migration and social change in the region.

Presenter 4

Within-Country Migration: The Predominant Form of Population Mobility in Asia *Gavin Jones*

Australian Demographic and Social Research Institute, ANU, Canberra & Asian Research Centre, Murdoch University, Perth

While various aspects of international migration take center stage in the media coverage of Asian migration, especially the more dramatic aspects such as refugee movements and human trafficking, internal migration in Asian countries receives less attention. This is unfortunate, since it is by far the dominant form of population mobility, and has major implications for urbanization, regional development, ethnic identity and gender roles in these countries. The presentation will note ways of measuring internal migration and the tendency for certain forms of mobility (commuting, circular migration, short-distance marriage migration) to be missed or under-counted in censuses and surveys.

The changing balance of the four main streams of internal migration – rural-rural, rural-urban, urban-urban and urban-rural over the course of development will be discussed, with specific reference to a number of Asian countries, as will the typical patterns of mobility by age and sex. There will also be attention to the role of internal migration in the process of urbanization and growth of megacities, in depopulation of some rural areas in low-fertility countries, and in growth and decline of different regions. Finally, the point will be made that internal migration and international migration should not be separated conceptually and that the two are closely intertwined in the experience of a number of Asian countries.

Plenary V	Ultra-low Fertility in Asia

Presenter 1

Policy Response to Ultra-low Fertility in Singapore <u>Mui Teng Yap</u> <u>Institute of Policy Studies, Singapore</u>

Singapore's Total Fertility Rate has been below the replacement level for nearly four decades and at "ultra-low" levels since 2003. This presentation shares policy responses to persistent low fertility in Singapore and the results of a study on public perceptions on the latest (2013) package of measures aimed at helping Singaporeans "fulfill (their) family aspirations".

Presenter 2

Ultra-low Fertility is a Gendered Issue <u>Peter McDonald</u> Australian National University Among the more advanced countries today, there are two distinct groups. One group (Group 1) has fertility in a desirable range (1.7 – 2.0 births per woman) while the other group (Group 2) has very low fertility (under 1.5). Group 1 includes all of the Nordic countries, all of the English-speaking countries and all of the French and Dutch-speaking countries. Group 2 includes all of the wealthier East and Southeast Asian countries, all of the Southern European countries and all of the German-speaking countries. Any proposed explanation of why a particular country has very low fertility must be consistent with this division of the wealthier countries into these two groupings.

The two groupings have remained the same over the past 15 years even though economic circumstances in the individual countries have fluctuated with the economic cycle. For example, the 2008 global financial crisis and its aftermath have not been positive for subsequent fertility rates in the Southern European countries but fertility was already very low in these countries before the crisis when their economies were humming. Likewise, some economies of the Group 1 countries suffered considerably through the economic crisis (e.g. the United States) but their fertility remained in the higher group. While economic circumstances are clearly important, variations in the capacity for women to combine childbearing with their chosen occupational pathways are a more reliable indicator of the fertility group into which a country falls.

Presenter 3

'Risk Society' and Ultra-low Fertility <u>Stuart Basten</u> <u>University of Oxford</u>

Very briefly, 'Risk Society' (as proposed by Ulrich Beck) entails the greater concentration of risk resting with individuals as opposed from being 'pooled' with either the state, (larger) families and/or employers. Very few studies have sought to identify a possible link between risk (and risk averse behavior) and demographic processes.

In this plenary lecture I explore the extent to which the 'Risk Society' framework is appropriate for understanding the transition to ultra-low fertility in parts of Pacific Asia. I suggest that the growth in personal risk can be identified in many of the more conventional 'drivers' of ultra-low fertility in Pacific Asia. Further, I argue that not tackling these sources of risk may be a reason for the relative lack of success of recent family policy interventions designed to encourage childbearing. I conclude with some observations about the extent to which countries currently seeing rapid fertility decline can be characterized as being 'Risk Societies' and what the implications of this might be for the future of low fertility across Asia.

Presenter 4

The Asian Economic Crisis and the Transition to Ultra-low Fertility: The Cases of South Korea and Taiwan

Doo-Sub Kim

Hanyang University, Seoul, South Korea

The Asian economic crisis that started in 1997 hit most Asian countries and raised fears of collapsing currencies, plunging GDP and rising unemployment. The deterioration in the economic conditions and labor market insecurity have affected fertility dynamics in most Asian countries over the past decades. This study explores the effects of the economic crisis on recent changes in the level of fertility and the pattern of socioeconomic differentials in South Korea and Taiwan. The focus is on a comparative analysis of children ever born (CEB) and the post-crisis CEB of married women. The main data sets used for the analysis are derived from the series of the Korean National Fertility Survey, conducted in 2003, 2006, 2009 and 2012. Data from the 2004 Taiwan Family and Fertility Survey are also analyzed in this study.

Results of the analysis reveal that the 1997 Asian economic crisis significantly affected the causal mechanisms of fertility in Korea and Taiwan. The decrease in fertility after the crisis has been most drastic among those with a high level of fertility, the lowest educational attainment and the least prestigious occupations.CEB and the post-crisis CEB show contrasting patterns according to a couple's socioeconomic status. In the context of ultra-low fertility after the economic crisis, the relationship between socioeconomic status and the level of fertility changed from a negative pattern to a positive pattern in Korea and Taiwan. For the highest socioeconomic group, in Korea, the level of fertility after the crisis tends to decrease slightly as socioeconomic status rises, and thus those withan upper-middle level of socioeconomic status show the highest level of fertility. By contrast, fertility in Taiwan does not show substantial deviations from a linear pattern of a positive relationship between a couple's education and fertility after the economic crisis, while occupational differentials show a reverse u-shaped pattern. The theoretical and policy implications of these empirical findings are discussed in this paper.
